Accommodations are designed to provide equal access to the same curriculum and educational content for students with disabilities or specific learning needs First, however, it is important to know the difference between the two Accommodations and modifications are both strategies used in education to support students with diverse needs, but they have distinct purposes and implementation methods. An accommodation changes how the student accesses and demonstrates learning, but does not change what the student is expected to learn or demonstrate School Accommodations and Modifications. What are accommodations? Allow student to take test orally instead of written. Accommodations change how a student learns or presents the material. IDEA indicates that IEP teams need to identify individual accommodations necessary for students with disabilities on state and districtwide assessments. Accommodations do not alter the content of assignments, give students an unfair advantage or inMore > Accommodations. Provide limited Without changing the curriculum content and without reducing learning/assessment expectations, accommodations are changes made to the student's learning Sometimes 'accommodations' and 'modifications' are used interchangeably, but they are different. The packet also presents guiding questions for determining "reasonable" education legislation about accommodations and modifications. Modifications change the outcomes or what the student is expected to learn. Simply stated, accommodations change the way the student is instructed or tested. Offer untimed testing. Accommodations is a term that is often used interchangeably with the term Accommodations Assessments Make sure material is left visible during quizzes. Accommodations are alterations in the way tasks are presented that allow children with learning disabilities to complete the same assignments as other students.
