And while we want to equip beginning readers by teaching phonics and sight words, word attack strategies are also important for when they meet “tricky” words. Strategies, such as direct teaching of word attack skills, can make it easier for students to read unknown words. Fluent reading leads to better comprehension of the text. Word-attack strategies help students decode, pronounce, and understand unfamiliar words. Understanding and applying the six syllable types to unfamiliar words can help readers successfully decode unknown words. They help students attack words piece by piece or from a different angle.
