Three The Relationship dimension of the Family Environment Scale, which consists of the Cohesion, Expressiveness, and Conflict subscales, measures a person's perception of the quality of his or her family relationship functioning. The FES is made up of ten subscales measuring three underlying dimensions: Cohesion, Expressiveness, and Conflict.
